A MESSAGE FROM YOUR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



With the summer months coming to an end rapidly, we hope everyone had a great fun filled summer. The highway department is

still working to complete road projects for 2024 and working on some maintenance and drainage projects. As in past years, the weather plays a large part in our paving projects. This year the weather has not had as much of an effect on our paving as the amount of paving going on and the need to coordinate with the paving companies. This has put us slightly behind this year with our paving projects. Nonetheless, the Highway Department is still anticipating finishing all our projects in the near future.

Green waste pickups will continue through November, leaf collection will start when enough leaves have fallen to get the crews out and continue for as long as the weather permits. Green waste pickups still start the first Monday of each month; all dates were posted in the first newsletter of the year. On our green waste dates, we will start early in the morning on the day of the pickup. ONCE WE HAVE GONE BY, WE CAN NOT COME BACK, please have your green waste material out ahead of the pick-up start date. We have received several complaints of green waste out at the curb for several weeks. After several years of picking up green waste with our compactor we are still getting questions about loose green waste at the curb. The only time loose green waste is picked up is at spring clean-up time in April. Brush is always picked up loose piled at the curb, brush is defined as tree limbs 1" or larger in diameter. As always, you can bring green waste to the highway garage between pickup dates. Please do not put out your green waste until 48 hours before the

scheduled date and do not put green waste, brush, leaves etc. in the ditches or over drainage. When drainage gets blocked, it may cause flooding or washouts. Please put green waste grass clippings, leaves in metal or plastic reusable containers for pick-up, this helps us be more efficient.

We are still going to have our last Saturday trash drop off at the Highway Garage on Saturday October 5. Please take advantage of the dumpsters at the highway garage during our normal work hours; please call ahead to let us know you are coming so we can have someone here to help unload and unlock the doors.

Remember all culvert pipes in the right of way need a permit to be replaced or repaired; the Highway department will size the pipe and require specific backfill material to be installed over the pipe. If culvert pipes are installed without permits, we have the right to pull the pipes out. Please call for the proper permits and information so this doesn't happen.

With fall fast approaching and winter just around the corner, just a few reminders please do not park in the right of way it makes plowing the roads very difficult. Do not plow snow across the roadway; you could be held responsible if it causes an accident.

***November:
4 - Green waste
and leaf collection
(if weather permits)

***The November green waste will only happen if the weather permits. Green waste will be collected from a container at the curb to be dumped in a compactor. Brush shall be piled separately for collection by a different crew to be chipped. Limbs shall be no more than 10' long or small enough to be handled by one person.

ASSESSOR – GEORGE HASKELL

STAR Applications for 2025 must be submitted prior to March 1st 2025. To receive the STAR Credit or exemption, you must own your home and it must be your primary residence.

Basic STAR

- The property must be the primary residence of an owner.*
- No age restriction
- \$500,000 or less for the STAR credit
- \$250,000 or less for the STAR exemption
- The income limit applies to the combined incomes of only the owners and owners' spouses who reside at the property.

Enhanced STAR

- The property must be the primary residence of at least one age-eligible owner.
- 65 or older
- All owners must be at least age 65 as of December 31 of the year of the exemption, except where the
 property is jointly owned by only a married couple or only siblings, in which case only one owner
 needs to meet the age requirement.
- Surviving spouses may be eligible to retain the Enhanced STAR benefit. See Surviving spouse eligibility.**
- For 2024 benefits: \$98,700 or less
- For 2025 benefits: \$107,300 or less
- The income limit applies to the combined incomes of all owners (residents and non-residents), and any owner's spouse who resides at the property.

Ownership

- The property must be owned by the eligible applicant(s).
- A married couple can receive only one STAR benefit regardless of how many properties they own, unless they are legally separated.
- Purchaser(s) in possession of the home under an executory contract of sale (aka land contract) are considered owners(s).
- Corporations, partnerships, and LLCs are not eligible unless it is a farm dwelling.

Any new exemptions MUST be filed prior to March 1st 2025.

HISTORY: THE BEGINNINGS OF THE NORTH GAGE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH:

Deerfield, October 7th 1829

The committee appointed at the last meeting of the Oneida Presbytery in Utica to take into consideration of the propriety of organizing a church in Deerfield, Gage's Patent, met at the school house in said place, at the time appointed.

Constituted by prayer

Committee - Oliver Wetmore, Chairman Stephen W. Burnett, Scribe Abijah Crane

Lineas (?) Younglove and Hezekiah House (a committee from the church in Trenton) Duncan Blue, Martin Wiser and Lewis Reed, (a committee from Gage's Patent) and Mr. Daniel McKay, Daniel Blue, and Isaih Johnson being present from the Church in Russia, were heard in relation to the subject of

organizing a church in the place above specified, pro & con.

The committee having hear all parties to their satisfaction, unanimously resolved, that a Presbyterian Church be immediately organized in Deerfield, Gage's Patent.

The committee then proceeded to the measures necessary to constitute the church and after prayer

by Mr. Crane, the following persons offered themselves for church members from the Trenton Church and presented their certificate of good and regular standing.

ANIMAL CONTROL

Fall is Here! Keep Your Pets Safe

Each season, there are a variety of things that could place your pets in danger and we are working to show you tips and tricks to keep them happy and healthy. Here are just a few things you can do to keep your pets safe in Autumn.

Be Mindful with Rodenticides

As rodents venture indoors to escape from the cooler temperatures of fall and winter, there is an increase of rodenticides used within homes. These rodenticides can be extremely toxic if not fatal if your pets ingest them. If you must use these items in your home, please use them responsibly and with extreme caution. Try to place them in areas that are not easily accessed by your pets.

Watch for Mushrooms

Both Spring and Fall are considered prime time for mushrooms to grow and although 99 percent of mushrooms will do nothing really to harm your pets, there is still that 1 percent that can be extremely toxic. It may be difficult to decipher which mushrooms are good and which are harmful to your pets so the best advice I can give is for your pet to avoid them all. If you spot your pet eating wild mushrooms, contact your vet immediately. You may want to also snip a sample of the mushroom and take it with you in a bag so the vet knows exactly what your pet ate.

Don't Spill Your Coolant

This time of year, many of us choose to change our vehicle engine's coolant. Coolants that are ethylene glycol-based can be extremely toxic to our four-legged friends. If you accidentally spill any of your coolants, please clean it up immediately. You may want to also consider switching to a propylene glycol-based coolant. Although this type is not completely non-toxic, it is far less harmful to your pets than the ethylene glycol-based coolant.

Beware of Snakes

This time of year, snakes who are preparing to hibernate can be a little grouchier than normal. This can mean bad news for your curious pet. You may want to learn more about the types of venomous snakes in your area and assess where these snakes may be located near your home. This way, you can try to avoid harmful areas and keep your pets safe from any dangerous snake bites.

As temperatures cool down, you should be mindful of your pet's needs. Take additional time to care for your pets. Make sure they have plenty of food to help them produce more body heat to fight the cooler temperatures and make sure they have access to clean, fresh, unfrozen water. With these tips and tricks, your pet will have a great fall season. Enjoy the crispness in the air and take a little time to let them play in a leaf pile or two.
