A NOTE FROM THE TOWN SUPERVISOR

The fall season has brought us beautiful weather and plenty of chances to enjoy the colors and scenery that make Deerfield such a special place. This Fall has been unusually warm, giving us even more opportunities to spend time outdoors and take in the best of the season.

We are finishing up work on the 2026 Town and Highway budgets, making sure that services and priorities are planned for in a careful and responsible way. The goal has been to remain fiscally responsible, balancing the needs of the community with long-term planning. We are pleased to share that the proposed budgets hold the Town tax at 0%, continuing our commitment to providing essential services without increasing the burden on taxpayers.

We'd like to remind everyone that **motorized or electric vehicles**, **like 4-wheelers** and dirt bikes, are not allowed on Town roads, property, or trails. They can be unsafe for riders and for others enjoying these spaces, putting people at risk of harm, and they can also cause damage to the trails and property we all share. There are local and state laws prohibiting this activity. If you are caught on the roads, property or trails with a motorized vehicle, the Town will pursue all legal remedies. No person shall operate an ATV on a highway, public property, or private property without permission of the landowner. ATV's include E-Bikes with throttles, or without peddles, or is capable of speeds more than 20 mph.

The Horatio Street/Pathstone project is still under review, and we sincerely thank residents who shared their concerns and input. Your voices have been invaluable in guiding both the Planning Board and Town Board throughout the process. Everyone on the Town Board has been working diligently to bring this project to a responsible and fair conclusion that reflects the views of our community.

We invite you to join a Town Board meeting and share your thoughts. Your input plays an important role in shaping the future of Deerfield, and hearing from residents helps the Board make decisions that reflect our whole community. Enjoy the Fall season!

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



With the summer months coming to an end rapidly, we hope everyone had a great fun filled summer. The

highway department is still working to complete road projects for 2025 and are working on some maintenance and drainage work. As in past years, the weather plays a large part in our paving projects. This year the weather has not been as much of a problem on our paving as the amount of paving going on and the need to coordinate with the paving companies. This has put us slightly behind this year with our paving projects. Nonetheless, the Highway Department is still anticipating finishing all our projects that we have started this year.

Green waste pickups will continue through November; leaf collection will start when enough leaves have fallen to get the crews out and continue for as long as the weather permits. Green waste pickups still start the first week of each month; all dates were posted in the first newsletter of the year. On our green waste dates, we will start early in morning the day of the pickup. **ONCE WE HAVE GONE BY, WE CAN NOT COME**

more than 48 hours ahead of the pick-up start date. We have received several complaints about green waste out at the curb for several weeks before the green waste pick-up start date. After several years of picking up green waste with our compactor we are still getting questions about loose green waste at the curb. The only time loose green waste is picked up is at spring clean-up time in April. Brush is always picked up loose piled at the curb, brush is defined as tree limbs 1" or larger in diameter. As always, you can bring green waste to the highway garage between pickup dates.

Please do not put out your green waste until 48 hours before the scheduled date and do not put green waste, brush, leaves etc. in the ditches or over drainage. When

drainage gets blocked, it may cause flooding or washouts. Please put green waste grass clippings, leaves in metal or plastic reusable containers for pickup, this helps us be more efficient. Over the past several months we have been finding large piles of brush to be picked up not piled net at the curb, this makes it vary tough for the crew to pull the brush off the pile to be chipped. Please pile your brush neatly to save the crew time and be efficient.

We are still going to have our last Saturday trash drop off at the Highway Garage on Saturday October 4. Please take advantage of the dumpsters at the highway garage during our normal work hours; please call ahead to let us know you are coming so we can have someone here to help unload and unlock the doors.

Remember all culvert pipes in the right of way need a permit to be replaced or repaired; the Highway department will size the pipe and require specific backfill material to be installed over the pipe. If culvert pipes are installed without permits, we have the right to pull the pipes out. Please call for the proper permits and information so this doesn't happen.

With fall fast approaching and winter just around the corner, just a few reminders please do not park in the right of way it makes plowing the roads very difficult. Do not plow snow across the roadway; you could be held responsible if it causes an accident.

Please be safe on the road, School is open, the buses are out. The traveling public going to work and other important places remember to stop for school buses picking up our children even on a divided highway.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT DATES TO REMEMBER IN 2025:

November green waste will only happen if the weather permits.

November:
3 – Green Waste / Leaf Collection
Weather permitting

All Green waste throughout the year will be collected from a container at the curb to be dumped in a compactor. Brush shall be piled separately for collection by a different crew to be chipped. Limbs shall be no more than 10' long or small enough to be handled by one person. Small green waste loose at the curb after spring clean-up will not be picked up.

FROM THE OFFICE OF BUILDING & CODES

IMPORTANT REMINDERS FOR THE COMING BUILDING SEASON

PET DANDER: Manufacturers of shampoos, lotions, cosmetics, and deodorants use Phenol to preserve their products. Phenols are also found in plastic materials such as water bottles and in household cleaning products. They can cause reproductive system toxicity and hormone disruption.

FLUORINATED CHEMICALS: there's a good chance that you are a happy pet owner who loves your animals and can't imagine life without them. In fact, according to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA) it's estimated that there are 70-80 million dogs and 74-96 million cats owned in the U.S. 37-47% of all households have a dog and 30-37

5 have a cat. All those pets produce allergens from their skin, saliva, urine, and feces. Cats cause allergies because of the FEL d 1 protein produced by their skin, saliva, and sebaceous glands. In Dogs, it's the Can f 1 and Can f 2 protein that trigger allergic reactions. These microscopic pet allergens remain suspended in the air for a long period of time and they easily stick to furniture, bedding, and fabrics reducing IAQ. For many people, animal allergens may cause them to experience congestion, sneezing, runny noses, wheezing and tightness in the chest Each individual is different but controlling pet dander is a big solution for controlling AIQ.

POLLEN IN THE HOUSE: Pollens originate from plants. They get inside your home through open doors and windows or tracked and carried in on clothing, many pollens are allergens that contribute to allergic disease and asthma. Even though these large pollen grains quickly settle, they can return to the air when disturbed creating unhealthy IAQ. Scientists believe that climate change and resultant warmer temperatures will call pollen season to start earlier in the year. According to the Berkeley lab, "between 1995 and 2013, the ragweed pollen season increased in 10 or 11 central U>S> and Canadian cities by 1-27 days per year...." And higher temperatures and higher carbon dioxide levels are linked to increased plant biomass, which could potentially cause them to create even more pollen.

CONTROLLIN MOLDE, DUST, DANDER, AND POLLEN IN YOUR HOME: The keys to controlling these biological contaminants and IAQ are cleanliness, adequate ventilation, moisture control. Maintenance of heating and air conditioning systems is held along with pest management to control insect and animal allergens, Air Conditioning, vacuuming with a heavy duty HEPA filter, and a quality air purifiers, are all effective in controlling the organic dust, pollen, mold, and pet dander that accumulates in your indoor air.

- The Town of Deerfield no longer issues Hunting or Fishing Permits – Walmart and Bass Pro are the nearest sites to issue them.

I would like to thank so many of you for your cooperation during this Town Wide Dog Numeration. Your responses have been amazing, so much so, that I have run out of steel tags. I am currently issuing licenses with a temporary Tag which will be replaced by the new steel tags, once they arrive. I am proud to say we are much closer to the State's licensing law than we have ever been.

It has been at least 15 years since our Town has performed a Dog Numeration. Many of the Towns do one every 5 years, going forward our town hopes to stay on a 5-year schedule.

Please note that if after this numeration, residents should continue to renew their dog licenses yearly, and if you are found to have an unlicensed dog, you may be charged additional numeration fee and possible fines by the court.

DEERFIELD HISTORIAN – JON FACCI

As I discover the local history of Deerfield, my intentions have been to focus on the original founding families. No one has been more iconic than Christian Reall, namesake of Reall Creek, by which he built his homestead. Reall Creek is a tributary that runs through Deerfield from north to south and empties into the Mohawk River. A descendant of the German Palatine immigration of the early 1700's by the British who were promised land in exchange for labor in the lower Hudson Valley, Christian Reall settled in Deerfield Corners, present day North Utica, in 1773 before being run off his land by the British and their Seneca allies at the start of our War for Independence. Once America won its freedom, Christian Reall returned again to raise his family in his cabin by the creek.

In Late August, we received an inquiry from the Oneida County History Center Research Library about the name Benjamin Walker. This led to some fascinating discoveries. First, I learned about Colonel Benjamin Walker, a Revolutionary War Veteran and Aide-de-Camp to Baron Friedrich Wilhelm von Steuben as well as George Washington for a time. Correspondence by letter between Colonel Walker and our first U.S. President can be found on the internet. Benjamin Walker (1753-1818) moved to Fort Schuyler in the 1790's as he'd been adopted as an heir by Baron von Steuben and caretaker of the deceased General's property in Remsen, NY. Colonel Walker would also become a United States Representative from 1801-1803 and his final resting place is in the Forest Hill Cemetery in Utica, NY.

However, our inquiry was about the Walker Farms on Roberts Road. Indeed, in 1845, a 37 acre parcel belonged to Benjamin Walker. Town Records show that on 1/20/1887, James Everett Walker was born to a 31 year old Benjamin Walker and his wife, Emma (Korber?), delivered by Dr. Hayes. Subsequently, William Ralph was born on 4/24/1894, "Baby" Walker on 7/14/1895, and Grant Walker on 10/18/1896.

Records are scarce from the early 19th Century, and everything we have, of course, is handwritten. Still, it is fun to watch the past come to life. I want to mention that I was pleased to meet my neighbors at the weekly Senior's Luncheon and I hope to share some presentations in the near future.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

ATV and E-Bike Restrictions:

As a continued reminder that motorized or electric vehicles (4-wheelers and dirt bikes) are not allowed on Town roads, property or trails. As you are well aware, there are local and state laws prohibiting this activity. If you are caught on the roads, property or trails with a motorized vehicle, the Town will pursue all legal remedies.

NYS Vehicle & Traffic Law, Section 2403:

No person shall operate an ATV on a highway, public property, or private property without permission of the landowner.

An ATV is defined as any self-propelled vehicle with two or more wheels to be used primarily for off-highway or in off-road competitions.

NYS Vehicle & Traffic Law Section §114-e, 1242, 1282, and 1284

ATV's include E-Bikes with throttles, or without peddles, or is capable of speeds more than 20 mph.
